Jan was a keen researcher but in all the vears that Norm was a member I don't think he spent 1 minute doing research **but**, Norm supported Jan, particularly in her role when President. In the early days Norm cooked many a barbecue at their home in order to raise funds for our group.

Our group had several homes before we settled into our present location. Norm was always on hand to organise and help move our resources from one location to the next.

It was never a problem for him to carry out many odd jobs about our Cottage.

Norm was our designated bus driver for several years and drove

Filling In The Gaps

It was when I decided to write my father's biography that I needed to fill in the gaps.

This took me on an interesting journey which included meeting WFHG's volunteer, Regina Hogan.

This is how the early life of my father began. His mother, Hilda Ann Louise Jarvis, nee Gale worked as a housemaid and cook in her father's Mornington Hotel at Mortlake which was for boarders only. When the hotel was being painted, Hilda showed an interest in the painter, Fred Stephen Jarvis. Her father would sit on the steps that led into the kitchen and continuously tell her all the reasons

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she shouldn't have anything to do with this man, and if she did, then he would disown her. A young independent woman being told, `don't'!!

Yes, Hilda left home and married Fred Jarvis on the 17th March 1902. After the death of their first born in 1903 whom they had called Arthur, after Hilda's father, they left on the 15th April 1903 on the Waikare a Steamship of the 'Union Steam Ship Co. of N.Z. Ltd travelling in Steerage, destination Auckland. While living in Auckland, New Zealand, Fred and Hilda had 4 children. Ruby Adel b. 17-04-1904; George Ernest b. 08-07-1906; Emil Durham b. 06-12-1908; Nellie Ereca b. 25-06-1910.

Then I hit a brick wall – when did they return to Australia? As I had found their departure, I felt confident that I should be able to find their return journey. But not so.

So what did I know? I knew that dad had said that he was pretty sure he was three years of age when he returned, and although I only had part of the story.

I knew they were in Australia in October 1912 because of an article found by the wife of my second cousin, Ron Jarvis, and sent to me.

Patricia, an avid Researcher herself sent this article, telling me the date of the Propeller Newspaper (Hurstville) to be 18th October 1912.

RUBY JARVIS. The nine-year-old girl who saved her sister from a burning building at Oatley on

October 5. Mr. Jarvis, on opening the dining-room door, was terrified when a rush of flames met his gaze. He realised ihat the house was on fire, and Set to work to save his children. He got his two little boys out safely, and then Ruby called out, "Where's Nellie?" her little sister, aged two. The flames got such a hold and the smoke was so thick that Mr. Jarvis was, for the moment, almost helpless to find his little daughter, but Ruby, in heroic manner, secured her from the room, wrapped a wet blanket round her, and placed her on the verandah. (By permission of "The Sun.")

This then gave me a second brick wall because it meant the original article in 'the Sun' newspaper should have more information, e.g. where was Hilda?

So, this was confirmation that dad was 3 years of age. He would have turned 4 in the December of 1912. I also knew that Nellie was born in Auckland as I have her birth certificate. This meant they returned between June 1910 and 18th October 1912.

It was when I called in to renew my membership 2019-2020 that I met a willing volunteer in Regina Hogan who offered to look for the return of the Jarvis family from Auckland to Sydney.

After much time and effort, which I will not detail here, Regina found that Mr & Mrs Jarvis and family comprising of 2 boys and 2 girls aged between 14 and 1, left Auckland as steerage passengers on the *Maheno* 8 April 1912. They arrived in Sydney 12 April 1912. Regina then went on to find the

In 1935 at the end of her commercial life she was sold to a ship-breakers yard in Japan. While under tow about 50 miles off the coast the towline broke in a cyclone and she drifted off and disappeared. Three days later she was found beached at Fraser Island.



This is the wreck still on Fraser Island today, and this is a photo of

my sister and her husband in front of this wreck.

So Regina had given me much more information than I could have hoped for.

Regina then very kindly took on the hunt for the rest of the newspaper articles about the fire at Oatley in the October of 1912. Yes, once again, more than I could have hoped for, Regina found not just 'The Sun Newspaper's' article, but found the story in three other newspapers as well, 'Singleton Argus on Sat 12 Oct 1912; 'The Sun' 10 Oct 1912; and 'The Sun Sunday' 13 Oct 1912. The article told me that Hilda was at a friend's place and on the way home saw her house on fire, Hilda fainted. I now had both gaps filled. Thank you, Regina. ... 🆓

Ancestral Road Trip

Back in 2016 my lovely wife Elizabeth and I drove to Quirindi, a picturesque little country town on the Liverpool Plains of N.S.W., hoping we may discover some information about her ancestors who had settled in the area many years before. Research indicated at least four branches of her family lived in the region from the early 1820s and a cottage built by her maternal Great Great Grandfather Joseph Baldock and his brother John which I understood was still standing though with nothing more to go on other than it was built at Long Point near Wallabadah so we held little hope of locating the old building until a chance conversation with a volunteer from the Quirindi



Rural & Heritage Museum. John & Joe Baldock are two brothers of 14 children born to Bounty Immigrants Thomas and Hannah Baldock (nee Lusted) who arrived here on the ship *Prince Regent* in 1839 with four of their children the youngest at the time was Sarah who was born at sea 13 days before arriving in Sydney.

In 1844 John Baldock left Glennis Creek NSW to go to Wallabadah at the age of 16 to work. His first employment coming to this district was sinking a dam then later he was employed on the Northern Rd now the New England Hwy. At 27, John returned to Glennis Creek & married Sarah Howlett on 20 Feb 1873. He returned to Wallabadah with Sarah & took up residence on his selection of 44 acres at Long Point in a hut by the creek where John and his brother Joe built the slab cottage. Later the kitchen building was carried over from across the creek to where John had purchased 7 acres from a Chinese couple, rebuilding the kitchen into the slab hut with the breezeway built between the two buildings.

While visiting the Quirindi Rural & Heritage Museum we got talking to one of the ladies who asked what drew us to the area. Well of course I couldn't pass up the opportunity to explain, in some detail it must be said, all about the wife's ancestors. From what we were told the Baldocks were and are still very well known in the region and mention of the cottage met with a most positive and helpful result. Not only did she know exactly where the old slab cottage was but she also had the phone number for the lady who was taking care of the property and promptly rang to let her know that she was soon to have two young visitors. Thinking nothing about being referred to as young it wasn't until we arrived at our destination where we were greeted by an elderly looking lady, Moira Scanlon, who asked if my wife and I were the youngsters she



was expecting. Moira was pleased to see us and thrilled to meet an actual descendant of the original builders. She told us she had been grazing her 10 cows on the property for several years and that she was about to buy two more cows so she would have an even dozen. I must point out that Moira was then 93 years young, a most remarkable woman who still cut her own firewood, milked her own cows and cooked a big pot of pea & ham soup once a week. I can only hope I'm half as spritely as she should I get to that age.

Back to John Baldock ... on settling down on his farm he acquired a horse team & commenced carrying cargo, mainly wool from Walgett to Morpeth. John & Sarah raised 11 children. John died at age 92 and Sarah died 18 months later aged 89. Frederick Baldock (their 7th child) lived on the farm till his death in 1974. Fred never married and never had power, water or plumbing installed in the cottage.



He cooked on a wood stove & water came from tanks. Fred died in the cottage as did his parents. The cottage was empty for 21 years, sheds collapsed, windows broke & cows wandered the yard. Moira Scanlon & her children have taken up the restoration, care and maintenance of the slab cottage. These days the cottage has been turned into a B&B for those who want to get away from it all yet still have a roof over their head.

On a personal note I think it's amazing that after all these years the cottage is still standing and still being used. I'm so glad we took this little road trip and I'm looking forward to another visit before too long.

A Tribute to Old Genealogists

They were avid indexers who, despite their individual indexing quirks, regularly produced accurate indexes of any material they could find.

Teams of now nameless indexers did the work. Some of them were very ill and only survived because indexing was a regular exercise. Many have now passed on. There are many genealogists who have contributed much to the many indexes that have been produced over the years.

Many Groups and Societies have introduced new resources that needed to be publicized. That was

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how

genealogists learnt. Some unknown genealogist would be ferreting around in the National Archives, Church Archives etc. and find a new resource. They would quietly inform others and voila, it became common knowledge.

Many modern genealogists don't know how the "stuff on the computer" got found and got made into a useable format". It is all the result of the old indexers and genealogists who went to great length to find, record and index various resources. *

Also dining there that night was one of my favourite authors, Nathan Dylan Goodwin. Nathan writes genealogy crime fiction and he kindly agreed to have his photograph taken with me which was a real thrill.

RootsTech, hosted by FamilySearch, was held over three days at the Excel convention centre in Royal Docks, London. With over 90 speakers from all over the world presenting a vast range of subjects, the hardest thing was deciding who to see! There were three speakers representing Australia -Kerry Farmer, Brad Argent from Ancestry.com and one

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of my new genimates Cathie Sherwood.

There were also keynote speakers each day. Dan Snow, a popular English historian, broadcaster and television presenter gave his talk on day one of the conference. What a great storyteller! He had the audience captivated with the sometimes painful tales of his own family, including the part his grandfather played in the Battle of the Somme.

Other keynote speakers were Steve Rookwood the CEO of FamilySearch, who gave an interesting recount of the history of FamilySearch. Kadeena Cox, a young British Paralympic gold medalist who told of her life after having a stroke and being diagnosed with multiple sclerosis. What an amazing young woman she is! Day three's keynote speaker was the entertainer Donny Osmond. Donny's presentation included old video clips, while sharing some of his family stories. He also managed to weave in a few songs including 'Puppy Love'.

With the RootsTech mobile app on my phone I was able to browse the conference schedule and highlight the speakers I wanted to see. It also enabled me to download the speakers handout notes.

All of the presentations I attended were great but some of the stand out speakers were;

- Diahan Southard -Ask the wife.
 A DNA research strategy
- Myko Clelland Beyond the British Census
- Shannon S Christmas Unlock the secrets in your DNA with GEDmatch

And then there was the exhibition hall with 60 exhibitors demonstrating their products and services, as well as a Demo Theatre and Discovery centre where attendees could ask for help with their own research questions. The exhibition hall was very popular and was always a throng of activity.

Nearly 10,000 people from 42 countries attended RootsTech London. I was glad to be one of them and loved the whole three day experience. The highlight? Definitely catching up with old genie mates and making new ones.





Impetus Required

Many years ago, I spent considerable time entering my family history records into an online computer program. Shortly after I 'finished', the program caught a virus and my information was scrambled. I found this incredibly frustrating, so I returned to keeping paper records, but also subscribed to Ancestry, Family Search and Findmypast to access their records. I decided that I would wait until I retired to digitise my work again. Retirement continues to elude me and my mountain of paper continues to grow. My 57 A4 size folders now have their own room in my home.

On New Year's Eve 2019, my world changed. We received phone notifications from the Rural Fire Service to 'watch and act' as there was a bushfire close to us. We also received panicked calls from our three children, who have smart phones that allow them to access information more efficiently via assorted Apps. That is another thing that has to change. Our 'dumb' phones are not good enough anymore, so we will be upgrading as soon as possible.

Our son, who lives locally, came over to help us do what we could to clear leaf litter and clean gutters etc. It was an incredibly hot day and I had been unwell, so I was sent inside to 'find what we should take with us', should we need to evacuate. You can see where this is going. I realised the need to grab our important papers, medications and some clothes, but what next? How much time did we have? How much room did we have? I have been married over 45 years and



between us, my husband and I have a number of hobbies, collections and precious things that we have inherited. How do you decide what to take? Most of what we value is irreplaceable. When I saw footage of people being evacuated from Mallacoota, they had hand luggage



or a pet, but not much else. What had they left behind and would it be there when they return?

There was no way I could take all of my folders, scrapbooks, our cats, suitcases of clothes, computer hard drives, USB collection and everything else that I considered to be important. Thankfully, the crisis passed and we did not need to evacuate. It did make us think very seriously about the practicalities for any future occasions. I have now started the process of creating Ancestry trees. I have also



catalogued what is on each USB I currently have and I have a ton of scanning to do. It will take a long time, but I have made a start... and not too soon. Yesterday, on our way home from babysitting at Gorokan, we drove up Hiawatha Rd, to find the RFS had the road partially closed. There was a grass fire on the left hand side of the road, near the

corner of our street. Thankfully, the RFS had it under control, but again, it set the heart rates soaring. Be prepared people. Back up and digitise. Have a plan. https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/planand-prepare/bush-fire-survival-plan

The Last of The Last Claude Stanley Choules 1901 – 2011

Claude Choules was born in Pershore, Worcestershire, on 3 March 1901 and raised in nearby Wyre Piddle. The son of Harry and Madeline (née Winn), Claude was one of seven children, although two died in early childhood. His mother left home when Claude was five, returning to the stage as an actress, and he and his older brothers were raised by his father. His older



brothers, Douglas and Leslie emigrated to Western Australia in 1911.

Choules was 13 on the outbreak of the First World War, and the family received letters from Douglas and Leslie who had joined the Australian Imperial Force and landed at Anzac Cove during the Gallipoli Campaign. Choules was able to leave school when he turned 14, at which point he attempted to enlist in the army as a bugler boy but was rejected as he was too young.

Choules' father then arranged for him to train to join the navy instead, and in April 1915, at age 14, he joined the nautical training ship TS *Mercury*.

This training ship was moored on the River Hamble, near Southampton, Hampshire, and had a dormitory ship called HMS *President* that had previously been HMS *Gannet*. The commander of the *Mercury* training site was the cricketer C. B. Fry, and Choules' time there included trips to Netley Hospital as part of the

Mercury's dancing team. The examinations taken by Choules following his training on the Mercury qualified him to attend the advanced class on the naval training ship HMS Impregnable situated at the Devonport naval base in Plymouth.

Choules transferred there on 10 October 1916, for what was to be the final stage of his training before joining the Royal Navy's Grand Fleet.

On 20 October 1917, Choules joined the battleship *Revenge*, which was the





flagship of the First Battle Squadron and stationed at Scapa Flow in the Orkney Islands. While serving aboard it, Choules saw action against a German zeppelin, and witnessed the surrender of the German Imperial Navy at the Firth of Forth in 1918, ten days after the Armistice, as well as witnessing the scuttling of the German fleet in Scapa Flow. In 1926, along with 11 other Royal Navy senior sailors, Choules travelled to Australia on loan as an instructor at Flinders Naval Depot. He travelled in SS Diogenes on a six- week voyage from London to Melbourne, and it was on this voyage that he met his

future wife Ethel Wildgoose ¹ who was travelling to Australia to carry out work for the Victoria League. Choules

decided to transfer permanently to the Royal Australian Navy (RAN) after sampling and agreeing with the Australian way of life.

He took his discharge from the RAN in 1931, but remained in the reserves and rejoined the RAN in 1932 as a chief petty officer torpedo and antisubmarine instructor. He never returned to England after leaving.


During the Second World War, Choules was the acting Torpedo Officer at HMAS *Leeuwin*, the naval base at Fremantle, Western Australia, and also served as the Chief Demolition Officer on the western side of the Australian continent. He was tasked with sabotaging Fremantle harbours and related oil storage tanks in the event of a Japanese invasion. Choules was also responsible for dealing with the first German mine to wash up on Australian soil during the war, near Esperance, Western Australia.

Choules remained in the RAN after the Second World War and transferred to the Naval Dockyard Police (NDP) to allow him to remain in service until 1956, as retirement from the RAN for ratings in those days was at age 50, while personnel could serve until 55 years old in the NDP.

Claude still had work to be done at sea ... crayfishing. And teaching a new generation about boats.

Choules and his wife Ethel were married for 76 years, until her death at age 98. Choules shunned celebrations of the Armistice, because he was against the glorification of war. His autobiography *The Last of the Last* was first published in Perth in 2009, followed by an annotated edition for UK readers in 2010.

On 13 December 2011, the former Royal Fleet Auxiliary landing ship *Largs*



Bav was commissioned into the Royal Australian Navy as HMAS Choules. The decision to name the ship after Claude Choules came about because of his status as the last surviving veteran of World War I; the naming recognises the service of enlisted sailors as part of celebrations of the navy's centenary (the ship is only the second vessel named after a sailor), and also acknowledges the ship's previous service under British control (Choules served in both the Royal Navy and the Royal Australian Navy during his career).

On 10 April 2014, the Pershore Town Council decided to honour Choules by naming a street ("Claude Choules Close") after him, in recognition of the fact that he was born in the town.

In November 2009, Choules became the oldest recipient of the Australian Defence Medal. (The medal was established in 2006 to recognise members of the Australian Defence Force who have served for more than four years after 3 September 1945

Mr Choules died in his Perth nursing home in May. Aged 110, he was the last known surviving combatant of more



than 70 million military personnel mobilised during the Great War.

Despite his long and distinguished naval career, Mr Choules had become increasingly pacifist.

His family has said they want Mr Choules to be remembered as a sensitive family man and a dedicated seaman who despite 41 years of service strongly opposed war.



George Herbert Cross

A further note by the Official Assignee states" With regard to the sum of £74.10.0 alleged to be due

Continuing My Grandfather's Story

by Hunter Bros to the Estate it appears that the Bankrupt entered into an agreement with James Channells for the sale of certain C.P.land at Bellingen upon certain terms. There is now a balance of £74.10.0 due by Mr Channells under the agreement. The Bankrupt also appears to have mortgaged his interest in the land

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to Hunter Bros and they intend to rely on their security. The matter is therefore one for adjustment between that firm and Channells, and it does not seem probable that there will be any amount available for the Estate in respect of the land in question." So poor old George was left with nothing, not even the land he had hoped to eventually own freehold. Drink was probably his only consolation.

Which of the people in these files was the one who "took grandpa down and taught him to drink?" This is the story Aunty Vic, George's youngest daughter, reiterated many times that a man with whom George went into business cheated him but also got him onto 'the drink'. Life must have been bad enough for this family without their father and husband coming home drunk and abusive. I have been told that George beat the boys mercilessly and it has been hinted on occasions that he sexually abused his eldest daughter, my aunty May. One cannot imagine that grandma would want to have any more children after 1911 when things appear to have gone from bad to worse, but as was the way in those days George prevailed.

So throughout this sorry period children continued to be born. Annie Milba was born in October 1914 and only lived for 4 months until 2nd February 1915. Rose Dorothy was born in August 1916 and lived for 20 months until August 1918. Victoria Eileen his



youngest child was born on 1st January, 1918. Grandma often spoke of her two beautiful lost babies. In this photo of grandma she is nursing Rose.

Bonville school opened on 3rd February 1902 and shows a record of attendance of the Cross children. The records include the date each pupil started school, their age, their religion and father's name, his address and occupation and on the right hand side columns showing which year the children were in each class. Unfortunately on the far right hand side is a column that has been cut off by the photocopier. It would have shown the date they left school. Aunty May is shown as starting in first class on 29th January 1907 but the family must have moved away for a period in that year because she started again in first class on 4th February 1908.

Other families whose names are familiar in these school records are the Hunts, Randalls and Channells. Below is a summary of the Cross history at the school.

BONVILLE, N.S.W. School records 1902 to 1929

Register No. 27 19th January 1907 May Cross age 7, religion E.C. (Church of England?) starting in 1st class. (There are no entries for kindergarten, so apparently children commenced in 1st class) Father shown as George Cross of Bonville *Labourer Shown to be in her first year of school 1907. No other entries after this date.

Register No. 41 4th February May Cross, 8 years old. Date of leaving last school 27th September (1907?) Left last school in 1st class. Father George Cross of Bonville * **Sleeper cutter.** The records then show that she was in second class in 1909, third class in 1910 and fourth class in 1912. No entries for May after this date.

Register No. 93 14th November 1911 (the date 25th June is written under his name, but this is not his birthday) Age 6.5 yrs religion E.C. Father George Cross * **Teamster**. He was in first class in 1911, Second class in 1914, third class in 1915, fourth class in 1916. (Further columns cut off by photocopier)

Register No. 100 29th November 1912 Edie Cross, age 6, E.C.religion. Father George Cross of Bonville is shown as * **Teamster**. She is shown as being in first class in 1912, second class in 1915, third class in 1916, fourth class in 1917, fifth class in 1918 and sixth class in 1919. The final column shows "Left" but not when (photo copy cuts off)

Register No. 140 8th February 1915, Phillip Cross (20th Oct under name) 6.3 years old, E.C. Father George Cross Bonville * **Teamster**. Phillip was in first class in1915, second class in 1917, third class in 1918, fourth class in 1919 and fifth class in 1920 (Any further columns cut off by photocopier.

Register No. 142 6th September 1915 Ida Cross (21st Aug. under name) age 5.0, E.C. Father George Cross ***Labourer**. Ida was in first class in 1915, progressed to second class first term 1917, third class 1918, fourth class 1919, fifth class 1920 and sixth class in 1921.

Register No. 193 29th January 1918 Herbert V Cross, age 6.0 E.C. Father George Cross of Bonville *Teamster. Bert was in first class in 1918, second in 1919, third 1920, fourth 1921, fifth 1922. (Further columns cut off)

There are no records at this school for Stanley (to be expected) or Victoria. Vicki would have started by 1923 or 1924, so grandma must have come to Sydney by then.

* Note George's various occupations.

Firstly the Randalls had three girls who started on 5th October 1909 in second, third and fourth class. Their father is described as a farmer. I know Kevin Randall through a mutual friend. He lived with his partner Graham Cann on their property "Cobar Station" near Miles in Central Queensland. We stayed on their property for about a week fossicking for fossilized wood which they mined commercially for export.

We hope to continue this very interesting saga in our next issue.
