
The changing nature of life during these times is not easy when trying to produce our publication. Our plans may change at any moment.

William Parsons Meeker – William & Marriage

We conclude this complex interesting story of the Meeker family.

Establishing that a relationship existed between

William Parsons Meeker and Elizabeth Vandenbrandt was for various reasons, a lengthy research process. Despite this article's focus on William Parsons Meeker, how we came to suggest that he not only married but he also had a son, required an extensive search and analysis of information on Elizabeth Vandenbrandt (1784-1861). Consequently, a lengthy discussion follows on how we came to our conclusion.

At the outset, we acknowledge that it is possible that William didn't marry Elizabeth, instead he gave his name as the father for her child. Alternatively, unbeknown to William, Elizabeth may have taken his surname as her own and named

William as the father (deceased) of her child.
However,

given the evidence, these are unlikely scenarios. Despite a lack of

To achieve this aim, we first looked for other family members for Elizabeth Vandenbrandt. The search located her grandparents' marriage. A marriage between Marey Igake and John Vanderbank,

evidence that a marriage occurred, there appears to be adequate documentation to indicate Elizabeth Vandenbrandt married William Parsons Meeker. Also, before William left England for America in 1812, they became parents for a son, who they named William Peter Meeker.

Initially, we only knew Elizabeth's first name. A search of various genealogy databases was undertaken. From our investigation, we determined that Elizabeth was an English lady named Elizabeth Vandenbrandt. She was born in Middlesex on 15 June 1784 and baptised on 20 January 1785. Her parents were Emanuel and Mary Vandenbrandt.

Elizabeth was 25 years old when she gave birth to William Peter Meeker on January 1 1810.

In order to substantiate her relationship with William Parsons Meeker, we sought to establish that Elizabeth Vandenbrandt and Elizabeth Meeker were one and the same person and confirm that she was William Peter Meeker's mother.

from St Giles in the Fields (London), was found within the Fleet notebooks. They married on 2 February 1746 and were parents for Elizabeth's father, Emanuel Vandenbrandt.

Emanuel was born in 1750 and married Mary (unknown). They had two sons and a daughter. Their sons did not survive childhood. However, Elizabeth lived well into her seventies.

Land rates for 1786 and other years confirm Elizabeth's father lived and worked at 32 Maddox Street, St George, Hanover Square, London. Given that Elizabeth was born in 1784, it is likely this Maddox Street address was her childhood home. Street Directories confirm Emanuel's address and list his occupation - a 'taylor' (a master tailor).

When the 1810 parish church baptismal record for William Peter Meeker became available, we were a little confused about what we read. The record names 'William Parsons' and 'Elizabeth Meeker' as his parents. We wanted to determine who were William Parsons and Elizabeth Meeker?

We discovered William Parsons Meeker's name after a brief search of newspaper archives. He was an American merchant, living and trading at 64, Basinghall Street, London, England, in the early nineteenth century.

The process for finding Elizabeth Meeker was not so simple. We found land tax documents which named Elizabeth's father, until his death in 1821, the 'Occupier' for 32 Maddox Street, St George, Hanover Square, London. Following his death, Elizabeth Meeker, not Elizabeth Vandenbrandt, is the named 'Occupier'. That document supports our view that Elizabeth Meeker was Emanuel Vandenbrandt's daughter, Elizabeth.

The UK census return for 6 June 1841 shows Elisabeth Meeker aged 55 years and of independent means. Elizabeth's age, 55 years, does not match her birthdate. The reason for this was the directive for Enumerators to 'round up or down', the age to the nearest multiple of 5 for a person over 16 years of age. Elizabeth lived at Toxteth Park, Lancashire, in the same household as William Peter Meeker and his wife, Charlotte (Callan) and their three children. Given William's mother was named Elizabeth Meeker (nee Vandenbrant) the





older woman living with William and Charlotte is William's mother.

The 1861 UK census asked people to submit their marital status. This census document shows Elizabeth Meeker 'widow'. Given William Parsons Meeker drowned at sea, almost fifty years previously, we believe that Elizabeth Meeker was his widow.

Very early into our investigation, the name of William Peter Meeker and Charlotte Callan's seventh child aroused our interest. Born in 1847, Francis Vandenbrandt Meeker's middle name resembles a surname. Often, children were given (and still are) their mother or grandmother's maiden name. We wondered if that was the case for Francis Vandenbrant Meeker? Following our discovery that Elizabeth Meeker (nee Vandenbrandt) was William Peter Meeker's mother (from parish church baptismal record) we could say "yes", Francis' middle name represents his relationship with his grandmother. This issue alone is a compelling acknowledgment of Elizabeth Vandenbrandt and Elizabeth Meeker's oneness, and her marriage to William Parsons Meeker.

A late purchase of the Will for Winifred Mary Charlier, one of William Peter Meeker's granddaughters, validated our findings. Among her effects were family silver spoons initialled with 'WPM' - William Peter Meeker and EV - Emanuel Vandenbrandt.

Despite no marriage record, we strongly suggest that William Parsons Meeker and Elizabeth Vandenbrant were a married couple. The punitive 1753 Marriage Act was in place and may have impacted on their relationship. That is, as Elizabeth's grandparents, John Vandenbrandt and Marey Igacke had done in 1746, Elizabeth and William may have had a clandestine. Clandestine wedding occurred when people weren't members of the Church of England faith. Catholics, such as Elizabeth Vandenbrandt, would undergo a marriage ceremony outside of the realms of the C of E (or outside of any other faith) church. Some records of clandestine marriages exist in Fleet notebooks, but most accounts have not survived. A search for a Meeker-Vandenbrandt marriage within the notebooks was unsuccessful.

It is also possible William and Elizabeth did not marry. Instead, they may have lived in a condition of 'customary concubinage'. According to some researchers, many English couples, in the late eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, lived together 'illegally'. That is, not adhering to church or State law, instead, the neighbourhood recognised their relationship.

William Parsons Meeker is said to have died at sea on his way back to America in 1812. We believe that at the time, he was a husband and a father. William Peter Meeker was the only child for Elizabeth and William. If William had not suffered an early death at sea, his son and daughter-in-law, Charlotte Callan, would have made him a grandfather eleven times. We can safely say, contrary to thinking thus far, that William Parsons Meeker has many descendants in

places such as England, Europe, Canada and Australia.

Our American ancestor may not have achieved greatness during his short life. Nevertheless, the new knowledge presented in this paper entitles him to more than a few sentences in the history books. William was from a respected Meeker family and enjoyed his time working with the fashionable Philadelphian high society. He appreciated the pleasures from wealth but, his money wasn't an inheritance. Rather, it came from hard work as a merchant trader. He took a financial risk, crossed the Atlantic and as an agent in London, he traded items for his business in Philadelphia. It was while he was in London that he experienced bankruptcy, which is probably the greatest emotional low any trader could experience. His marriage to Elizabeth Vandenbrandt provided him with a son and heir. Perhaps she rescued him from homelessness when his home and effects were forcibly sold to raise dividends for his creditors? Our one hope is that as a consolation for his misfortunes, becoming a husband and father made William Parsons Meeker a happy man.

Clearly, William's story is a mysterious one. Did he inform anyone in Philadelphia or his family in New Jersey that he had married and had a son? We've not seen discussions in the US literature of William's financial woes despite his American business partnership and connections. It needs to be asked, were his business partners/family members aware that he was bankrupt and that he was both a husband and a father, and. did they chose to bury this information when William died at sea?

How did William Parsons Meeker spend his time between the discharge of his bankruptcy in 1809 and his death in 1812? An important subject for further research would be the circumstances surrounding William's death.

THE MYSTERY OF GRAHAM DREDGE

Continuing the story of this family of wanderers.

Ruby and Graham reconciled in Kalgoorlie and created a child - Gordon Havelock Dredge, who was born in the Straits Settlement on 26th May 1910. I am not sure why Ruby chose to return there for the birth. Perhaps her parents were still

residents, and she needed their support. Now things become decidedly fuzzy. Graham is listed on the Electoral Roll for 1910, living at 43 Varden St., occupation accountant. Other Ancestry researchers have Graham dying in Kalgoorlie, sometime in 1911, but

there is no BDM record, no sign of him in Kalgoorlie cemeteries or any other source I can locate. The only reference found so far is in the 1928 obituary of Ruby.


MRS. DREDGE

Many Penrith residents will be deeply grieved to learn of the death of a very esteemed ex-resident of this town, Mrs Ruby Constance Dredge, which took place at her residence, Haig Street, Wentworthville, on Sunday, after a lengthy illness. This community was greatly indebted to the deceased lady, particularly by reason of her splendid musical services on behalf of many public movements. Her

the daughter of the late Mr W. H. Williams, and of Mrs Williams. Her father was a mining engineer, and his professional duties engaged him at one time or other in every State of the Commonwealth, in New Zealand, and in the Straits Settlement. Seventeen years ago he and his wife came from the Straits to Penrith, and continued to reside here till he died some nine years ago.

On December 5, 1907, Mrs Dredge was married at Broome (West. Australia) to Mr Graham Dredge, who died about 17 years ago. For many years Mrs Dredge resided in Penrith, and left here a few years ago to take up her residence at Wentworthville.

She is survived by her mother, a son (Gordon), a brother (Mr W. T. Williams, Kalgoorlie, West Australia), and two sisters (Mrs W. H. Hand, of Penrith, and Mrs Hogan, of Penang, Malay Peninsula).

The funeral took place on Monday, the remains being brought to John Price and Sons funeral parlors (sic), Penrith, and afterward, to the Methodist portion of Penrith general cemetery. Rev. W. T. Stuart-Wright conducted the service. A number of beautiful wreaths were received, including one from the Penrith Methodist Church choir.

Graham would have been 30 in 1911. I find it very strange that there is no mention of him in the newspapers of the time either. Accountancy is not a dangerous occupation! Did Graham disappear again? Was it easier for Ruby to

say she was a widow and start a new life in the east?

As you can see from the obit., Ruby and her young son eventually settled in the Penrith area of NSW. Her parents and one married sister were nearby. She established herself as a teacher of young people wishing to learn musical instruments, singing and dramatics. Her son Gordon was her star pupil. There are many articles in the Nepean Times and other local papers that detail concerts arranged by Ruby and performances by Gordon. Her father WH Williams died in 1919 and her mother later in Dec. 1928.

Ruby's youngest sister, Olive married Claude D.D. HOGAN in 1912, in the Straits Settlement. In 1939, just after the declaration of war with Germany, the Hogans left London for Singapore. Once Japan entered the war, Singapore was no longer safe, so civilians were evacuated, using any vessels available. Claude opted to stay. Olive, a nurse, left on the small Dutch owned coastal steamer "Tandjong Pinang", with many other women and children on 14 Feb., the day before Singapore fell. Along the way, they rescued others whose ships had been bombed by



Japanese planes. There were over 200 souls onboard. Their vessel later was sunk in the Bangka Strait on 17 Feb. 1942 by the Japanese. Most on board lost their lives by drowning. About 15 were captured and taken to a nearby POW camp, but most did not survive the war.

Olive did not survive. Claude was captured in Singapore and spent time as a POW in Changi but survived the war. He was a barrister. Their 2 adult children, Sylvia and Claude were safely out of harm during the war- Claude in England and Sylvia in Perth.

Of the 13 children born to WH WILLIAMS and his wife Mary Ann BRUNSDON only two, Elizabeth HAND and Walter T WILLIAMS lived to relative old age, Elizabeth reaching 75 and Walter 68. Seven children died in infancy. That must have been heart-wrenching.

Of the DREDGE family, only two of the daughters married and had children. The DREDGE name lived on with Gordon, who married in 1937 and had 3 sons. Gordon was a gifted student, who excelled at Mathematics, Music and English. He was dux of his primary school and attended Sydney Grammar School. He went on to follow in his father's footsteps and became an accountant! The circle is complete.

MELAKA WARRIOR MONUMENT

Bukit Cina, Malacca City, Malacca, Malaysia

Malacca Warrior Monument, officially the Malacca Warrior Monument for the Chinese victims of Anti-Japanese occupation 'Malacca Warrior Monument for the Chinese victims as a result of opposing Japanese colonisation') is a monument at Bukit Cina in Malacca City, Malacca, Malaysia. It was built to commemorate the Chinese victims of the Empire of Japan occupation of Malacca as part of British Straits Settlements during World War II and was unveiled officially by then high commissioner, Sir Edward Gent in 1948. The first known major renovation for the monument was in 1972. The monument is inscribed with four Chinese characters, "军真足式" (pinyin: Zhong Zhen Zú Shì) in Chiang Kai-shek's handwriting, which means "their (those who have fought against the Japanese) loyalty can be taken as an exemplar".

The epitaph is written in Classical Chinese and is translated as below:

After the Marco Polo Bridge Incident, the Overseas Chinese called for the opposition of the



Japanese rule and rallied for the rescue of the country by donating money and belongings. The Chinese diaspora in Nanyang joined the Allies in armed conflicts against the Japanese, thus the Japanese suppressed the Chinese diaspora for opposing them.

On 15 January, the 31st year of the Republic of China, the Japanese conquered Malacca, and the local expatriates suffered terrible encounters. In the beginning, the Japanese Army searched door-to-door for anti-Japanese dissidents, and approximately 300 people were killed for being involved in anti-Japanese efforts. After that, 56 workers from the Asahan Rubber

Estate, and about 200 residents of Jasin Hot Spring Area and other villages were killed, one after another. Thousands were killed by the Japanese Army; some were killed by sword, some were crushed on their skull, some were disembowelled, some were buried alive collectively, and some were trapped in a closed room and then burnt alive. Despite this, they faced their demise with courage and the

Japanese with no fear. Some berated the Japanese right in front of them before dying and some remained silent until the end. It was rare to hear about people pleading and surrendering to the Japanese. It is evident that they stuck to their principles and died heroically. ...

SINGAPORE'S DUNKIRK

Lieutenant Geoffrey Brooke served in the battleship 'Prince of Wales' which sank on 10 December 1941. He survived this ordeal and when the opportunity came, he and a number of his shipmates escaped in the river steamer Kung Wo. Brooke writes of his experiences in Singapore's Dunkirk (Brooke 1989), but tragically this episode did not emulate the success of the English Channel crossing.

Another unfortunate consequence leading to confusion was that naval personnel responsible for coding and decoding signals were approved to leave the island aboard 'HMS Jupiter' in the early hours of 12 February. As they had destroyed all code books the Rear Admiral Malaya was thereafter unable to read signals. While the presence of a Japanese Fleet, bound for Sumatra, was known to



Naval Historical Society of Australia the Dutch it was no longer possible to pass this information to Admiral Spooner. This proved disastrous as by dreadful coincidence the Japanese invasion fleet heading for the Banka Strait converged with the approaching fleet of small ships departing Singapore.

With the Japanese now within gun range on the opposite side of the Causeway a few thousand more persons escaped in an organized convoy on the night of 11/12 February. Afterwards a fragile fleet of forty-four independent unescorted sailings occurred on 'Black Friday' 13 February, with a few stragglers coming behind on 14 February. Over the final five-day period before surrender on Sunday 15 February 1942, about 5000



souls escaped but less than one in four made a safe landing, the rest being killed or captured.

On paper the escape plan seemed straightforward, a 20-mile passage over the Singapore Strait at night, and then laying up under cover of one of the numerous Netherlands East Indies islands, before island

hopping to cover the next 60 miles and crossing the Banka Strait to the large island of Sumatra. The Japanese, however, were well aware of this deadly game of cat and mouse and had set a trap with aircraft overhead and ships guarding the Straits which caused havoc. ...


