
Another issue a little late.

Your stories help to make our publication interesting and the deadline for the next Tree of Life is 20 January 2021.







country, including Northern Territory. The Cemetery collection comprises books, some four hundred [roughly], and CDs, which are loaded onto three of our computers. NOT All of the information in the books can be found on line and are certainly worth looking at for Ancestors. A couple of weeks ago I had a member who was looking for extra information on an ancestor who was buried at the Devonshire St Cemetery, which is now Central Railway. The bodies and headstones had been moved but the member was unable to find further information about where

In our collection is a book called 'Sydney Burial Ground 1819 - 1901, where our member was able to find information on the ancestor including a sketch of the old headstone, none of which is available online.

Other Family History groups have compiled books that include graves that are on old family properties, old Cemeteries that are no longer used as well as the main Cemeteries of towns big and small. I have found entries for my own ancestors in the Port Macquarie and Cootamundra regions ranging from considerable amount of information about the person to just one line entries with name, date of death and burial plot number.

I would really encourage our members to take advantage of this valuable collection and consider using it for research to

Legitimation


In 1902 the Legitimation Act was passed to allow the reregistration of the birth of an illegitimate child – whose parents had subsequently married – to be updated to include details of the father and the marriage of the parents. This could only be done if there was no legal reason why the parents could not have married when the child was born.

- These new records were entered in the year of the reregistration, and the original registration was cancelled.
- The new number was recorded in both the year of birth and the year of re-registration.

In 1913, a change was made so that parents of an illegitimate child could record their marriage details by way of a declaration. This arrangement was for parents who had been unable to marry at the time of the birth for a legal reason, but had married later.

Declarations

In 1913
arrangements were

registered. This included:



- parents who had not been able to marry due to a legal reason when their child was born [addressed by the Commonwealth Marriage Act in 1961]
- foster parents who had informally adopted a child and were unable to record their details on the child's birth registration [legal adoptions were introduced in 1924].

A declaration allowed for details to be recorded by the Registry and although no formal registration was created, certified

copies of the details were issued.

Declarations were indexed along with normal registrations in the year of the birth, although in some instances the index entry appears in the year the declaration was made without cross-reference to the year of birth.

More than 4000 declarations are held by the Registry however some contain little information about events.



Many years ago, researching family history was not as simple as today. Visiting reading rooms and searching microfilm/fiche usually resulted in motion sickness for me.

On one expedition to NSW State Records Globe Street, the

Rocks, I found a notation regarding my father's brother 1934 Legitimised, I duly noted the registration number, life happened and I promptly forgot about this.

Recent offers of discounts on transcriptions prompted me to follow this up. When the document arrived, all the information I knew was duly recorded, however, the last two items prompted me to research this Act.

As my grandmother died in 1926 when Uncle Norm was 32, I guess I will never know why my grandfather registered this information when Uncle was 40. They had married in 1899.



Dumbleyung

According to Wikipedia:

"Dumbleyung is a town and shire in the Wheatbelt region of Western Australia, 267 kilometres (166 mi) south-east of Perth between Wagin and Lake Grace on State Route 107. Dumbleyung's name is of Noongar origin, coming from "Dambeling" which possibly means "large lake or inland sea" (although another source suggests it came from "dumbung", a game played with bent sticks and a hard piece of fruit. The lake nearby was discovered and named Dambeling Lake by explorers Henry Landor and Henry Maxwell Lefroy in 1843, and the current spelling was used by surveyors in the 1860s and 1870s. Pastoralists and sandalwood cutters moved into the area, initially settling at Nippering. north of Lake Dumbleyung and 10 kilometres (6 mi) west of the present town."

Dumbleyung may spark a memory with those interested in speed and Donald Campbell.

On New Years Eve 1964
Donald Campbell set the world
water speed record when he raced
his boat Bluebird across the lake
at 444.66 km/h (276.3 mph). This
made him the fastest man both
on land and on water.


Dumbleyung itself is a service centre with a post office, school, tavern, public library, caravan park and other facilities. Both the tavern and roadhouse offer counter meals. The community used to host the Bluebird Festival each November, though it was discontinued and effectively

replaced by the 'Taste of Dumbleyung' event; the festival showcases the









produce of the region alongside local entertainment attracting visitors to the town each April.

The surrounding areas produce wheat and other cereal crops. The town is a receival site for Cooperative Bulk Handling.

"Taking Tea"

A bronze life sized statue "Taking Tea" commemorates the contribution of members of the Country Women's Association (CWA) in Dumbleyung which commenced in 1930 and closed in 2013. It is dedicated to all past and present members.

The statue symbolises what the Country Women's Association means to so many country communities. The two women having a "cuppa" together represents an older woman pouring a cup of tea to a younger woman and perhaps new member to the CWA.

The Country Women's Association was first formed in New South Wales and Queensland in 1922. Subsequently each State and the Northern Territory formed an Association, a process which took a period of 14 years. The aim of the Association is to improve the conditions for women



and children and make life better




for families, especially those living in rural and remote Australia.

When we were more mobile, Harry and I travelled throughout most of our vast land. The southwestern corner eluded us. There are many places in the vicinity making for an interesting detour.

I first heard of Dumbleyung

early in my family history journey. Harry Johnston-Lord's father spent some time in the area as a labourer in the 1920s although voter records show his name as Thomas Lord, later records show him as Thomas Johnston-Lord.

Night Witches

"Night Witches" (German nickname for the all female military aviators of the 588th Night Bomber Regiment, known later as the 46th "Taman" Guards Night Bomber Aviation Regiment, of the Soviet Air Forces. Though women were initially barred from combat, Major Marina Raskova

used her position and personal contacts with the Chairman of the Council of People's Commissars, Joseph Stalin, to obtain permission to form female combat units. On October 8, 1941, an order was issued to deploy three women's air-force units, including the 588th Regiment. The

regiment, formed by Major Marina Raskova and led by Major Yevdokiya Bershanskaya, was composed of primarily female volunteers in their late teens and early twenties.

An attack technique of the night bombers involved idling the engine near the target and gliding to the bomb-release point, with only wind noise left to reveal their presence. German soldiers likened the sound to broomsticks and named the pilots "Night Witches". Due to the weight of the bombs and the low altitude of flight, the pilots did not carry parachutes until 1944.

When the regiment deployed to the front line in June 1942, the 588th Night Bomber Regiment became part of the 4th Air Army of the Southern Front. In February 1943 the regiment was honored with the Guards designation and reorganized as the 46th Guards Night Bomber Aviation Regiment in the 325th Night Bomber Aviation Division, 4th Air Army, 2nd Belorussian Front; in October 1943 it became the 46th "Taman" Guards Night Bomber Aviation Regiment.

History and Tactics

The regiment flew harassment and precision bombing missions against the German military from 1942 until the end of the war. At its largest, it had 40 two-person crews. The regiment flew over 23,000 sorties, dropping over 3,000 tons of bombs and 26,000 incendiary shells. It was the most highly decorated female unit in



the Soviet Air Force, with many pilots having flown over 800 missions by the end of the war, and twenty-three having been awarded the Hero of the Soviet Union title. Thirty-two of its members died in the war.

The regiment flew in woodand-canvas Polikarpov U-2 biplanes, a 1928 design intended for use as training aircraft [hence its original uchebnyy designation prefix of "U-"] and for crop dusting, which also had a special U-2LNB version for the sort of night harassment attack missions flown by the 588th, and to this day remains the most-produced wood-airframed biplane in aviation history. The plane could carry only two bombs at a time, so eight or more missions per night were often necessary. Although the aircraft was obsolete and slow, the pilots took advantage of its exceptional manoeuverability; it also had a maximum speed that was lower than the stall speed of both the

Messerschmitt Bf 109 and the Focke-Wulf Fw 190, which made it very difficult for German pilots to shoot down, with the exception of fighter ace Josef Kociok, who grounded the regiment for an entire night by shooting down three or four of their planes on the night of 31 July – 1 August 1943.

Cold welcoming

This all-female aviation regiment was not welcomed initially into the military with open

arms. Many of their male counterparts saw them as inferior and treated them with lack of respect. The women of the regiment were also given handme-downs of uniforms and oversized shoes by the men, as well as rudimentary tools [such as rulers, flashlights, pencils, etc] that lacked the "luxury" that the male soldiers received with their tools [e.g. radar, guns, radios, etc]. ...

I can remember, at the time I heard of his death, that I was told he was drowned when a coastal steamer sank. I can also remember 'Bombo' being mentioned. Was this the name of the ship or where the sinking was supposed to have happened, or is it just the name of the ship upon which he served. I have spent much time over the years looking into this story without success.


Meanwhile great grandma continued to live in the same home on Singleton Road, and despite her son's treatment of his family, she remained in close touch with grandma. I can remember going up to visit her a couple of times with Mum and Grandma.

Very near the end of her life aunty Vicki gave me 'Grandma's box' an old sewing box containing treasures of grandma's. These include birthday cards etc. from her parents and grandparents including a letter from great grandma written in 1952 when she would have been 97. In this letter was a photograph

of George, this being the only one in existence as far as I know, except for the one taken as a child.



Letter from great grandma to grandma. It is amazing that the letter found her because the envelope was address to Mrs A Cross, Indianna Avenue Bellport. This should have been Indiana Avenue Campsie or Belfield. The letter says:



"Wisemans Ferry 14 52

Dear Annie just a line to let you know I am better than I was when you were here. I don't know the address so you send the photo to Victoria. Give my love to all the girls and to your own dear self.

I remain yours ever M Cross

Ida is in ? at present [Ida was her daughter]

I have wondered why she sent the photo and thought it might mark the date of his death. As you will see below it poses more questions that it answers.

No such luck that date of photo is noted on the back but George looks about 60. Unfortunately his hat covers his bald head, but he is certainly dressed as described in the Police Gazette. The picture shows us who takes after him and among these are Uncle Phil [his eldest son], Peter Drummond his great grandson, and Cameron Curtis also his great grandson. There are many rabbits strung along the sides of his horse and one could assume that at this stage he was earning money shooting rabbits for skins and meat. This could be taken on the Hawkesbury but certainly not on the flood plain along the river. The rabbit skins were probably sold to Akubra for felt hats.

So this story is about a man who always remained beloved by his mother. Was he a worthy man who despite all his efforts became bankrupt, watched his family remain hungry and needy, watched his horses and then his bullocks die and finally tried to

find comfort in drink in the grip of which he became a belligerent and cruel abuser? If this is so, he would be deeply ashamed of himself in his sober moments and would escape into the drink again. Or was he just a really weak person who irresponsibly got grandma pregnant and retreated to the north coast where he was chased down by his future fatherin-law to make his daughter an honest woman. He certainly kept close company with his brother, who was a criminal and wife deserter ... Take your pick.

- A further picture of George Herbert has come to light thanks to my cousin Kevin, youngest son of Philip Cross.

In her later years Aunty Vic [his only remaining child] relented and gradually over many visits told me more about him. She said he was a very clever man with his hands and anything he built was beautifully done. Of course she told of the terrible times the



family endured because of George's drinking. She told me that George, whilst living with his mother, and a neighbour called Rose built a trawler for a Sydney Italian fisherman. When completed George and the fisherman set out from Wiseman's Ferry to deliver the boat to Sydney. Aunty Vic's memory was that as they got to the entrance of Broken Bay in the night a terrible storm blew in from the south. She thought that some of the boat was found on Lion Island, but the bodies were never found. She

thought she was about 18 at the time.

Without a date, name of boat or his companion I could find no record which matched this information. In my search I went through Police Gazettes in the hope of finding some confirmation of Vicki's story. I did find one entry about George where grandma obtained judgment for child maintenance.

It was post-war England. From 1952 my dad's parents, Fred and Mary Charlier lived in Oxfordshire and later in Buckinghamshire. My dad, John, and my mum, Betty, with their growing young family visited

grandparents every Christmas for Christmas lunch.

When our cousins arrived, we were allowed to open our presents. That is, we were given one present from under the Christmas tree and then we waited for what seemed like 'forever' [probably an hour] for the next present. When I grew up and married, my children were subjected to a similar 'torture' in a belief that the 'wait' time would enable them to appreciate the gift and the person who asked Santa to bring it to them.

I also remember that after lunch everyone moved to the lounge room where there was a roaring fire to keep us warm. It was always cold at that time of the year and sometimes it snowed on Christmas Eve and/or Christmas day. The adults would drink, smoke and chat while we

children played with our new toys. At some point, the heavy lounge room curtains were closed, no doubt to keep the warm air in, or the cold air out?

It could get pretty noisy in the lounge room. Therefore, Grandpa would leave the happy gathering and go upstairs for his afternoon 'nap'. Shortly afterwards, Granny would open up the curtains, a loud gasp would follow because in the garden,

walking towards the house was the man in a red suit carrying a sack of presents.

Santa's arrival was always a wonderful surprise, and one that sadly, Grandpa missed every year!

Christmas 1957 in Scotland

Christmas 1957 when Christmas Day was first celebrated as a holiday in Scotland.

It was November 1957 when we first heard, Christmas Day was to be declared a holiday in Scotland. The combined Christian churches of all denominations had finally won through. No more would Christmas Day be blasphemied in Scotland, by the opening of pubs and the trudging feet of thousands, tramping into factories, shipyards, shops and offices, as just another working day: marked only by the secret



I know it was 1957 because on the 14th October, my 15th birthday, I had walked out of school in selfrighteous rage and anger, vowing never to return. Fifteen was the official leaving age, so I could not be made to go back; I began working. You may read/hear that 1958 was the first year Christmas Day became a holiday in Scotland, not so, that may have been the year it was officially gazetted, but not the first year it was taken as a holiday.

Families and friends gathered & gossiped: "Why weren't we told, nobody asked us, mark my word this is the sassanachs's, [the English] doing, they've been trying for years to ban hogmanay, well I'm no having it, I'll be writing to my local M.P., and I'll be having a word or two with the minister". "Aye Ellen, my Dave says he's going to work on Christmas Day, nobody's docking

him a days pay; be taking it up with the unions". Of course when it finally became clear that it would be a paid holiday and our traditional hogmanay plus 1st & 2nd of January, paid holidays' would remain, well that was different, that was fine. Didn't go down too well with the English, we having more paid holidays' than them, but what did we care. So Christmas Day was awaited with great anticipation that year.

As usual the decorations all went up in shops and houses, as did the small Christmas tree with fairy lights, tinsel and a few Christmas baubles, stood on a table, radiogram or whatever, always at the window fronting the street, generally the living room window. That way all the windows would be lit up on the dark winter's nights as everyone returned home from the pictures, a wee dance, or visiting friends, etc.

All windows were commented on, who'd put on a good show and who hadn't. And, always the conversation invariably was, would the snaw [snow] come in time for Christmas day, was "it cauld [cold] enough for snaw [snow] yet". This year especially we longed for snow; but it didn't come, at least not for Christmas. Come Christmas eve, the excitement was palpable, it had been generally agreed that the weans, [smaller children] would open their presents first thing on waking as usual, but everybody else would wait until dinner time

[around 2 p.m this year] or the arranged time for family & friends to gather and presents would be



opened then. Our immediate family, brother and wife, unmarried brother, mother and myself all gathered at my sister's home with her husband and wee Robert, who was only two. Also a few of Margaret's elderly neighbours, widows on their own with no family nearby. Margaret was good like that, a kindly nature. Our father wouldn't be there, he was in hospital, he had cancer. What a day it was, all crammed in at the small extended dinner table, not enough room for all, brother Aitken and big Robert, Margt., husband, perched on the edge of armchairs, wee Robert sat on the floor. Dinner was nothing special, mashed potatoes, green peas, and either roast chicken or mince with onions. Custard and tinned fruit to follow; Christmas crackers, paper hats & funny masks. No alcohol, a wee drink would come later. We had a wonderful time. Once everything was cleared away, we all settled in for the sing-song, men with a beer and whisky chaser; women with a wee port or sherry or a cup of tea and a wee bit of sultana cake. Everybody took their turn with a song, being Christmas Day, Christmas hymns

and carols were accepted, or they'd recite some poetry or a written piece, then at different times, someone or other would stand and give a toast, to the baby Jesus, to Christmas or to the hostess and the conviviality of the day. Always somebody would turn and look out the window, "is that snaw falling, or is it only sleet." So it continued until 11 p.m at night with different ones coming & going. A great day was had by all.

That was the very first time Christmas Day was a public holiday in Scotland and we celebrated it ever after, though it never replaced Hogmanay, at least not for a very, very long time. On boxing day, not officially a holiday, but many took it anyway, we all trooped out to Stobhill Hospital, Glasgow, with presents, to visit my father. He'd had a great Christmas day also as had all the other men on the ward, they'd had the choice of roast chicken or roast beef with roast potatoes, gravy, veggies

etc., followed by either custard and dumpling, or trifle, or icecream and fruit. Most had been allowed a wee dram & to add to the merriment the young nurses had all dressed up, a few in french maids costumes, black stockings and suspenders on show. They'd also rubbed icecream all over some men's chests and some openly wondered where else might they have, but my Daddy swifty put an end to that, "enough oh that, my youngest lassie's only 15yrs". But again a great time was had by all, on both days. Not sure it's quite what the churches had in mind, but in our home at least the new annual holiday was declared a


