## **HERITAGE MONTH**

April next year is Heritage Month and the Group have decided to have a walking tour of Jilliby Cemetery where we will point out the graves of some of Wyong's notable citizens from the past as well as a few less notable citizens who have contributed to Wyong's development. Also, in a further remembrance of WW1 the graves of men who served in the Great War and who are buried at Jilliby will also be recognised. Final dates for these tours are still to be finalised.

## **ANZAC AVE WYONG and ANZAC RD TUGGERAH**

These two streets in our Shire were officially named on 12 August 1916 and 26 August 1916 respectively. They were named in honour of the men who went to the Great War. Each street was planted with trees, generally by family members of those who went to the war.

In recognition of the naming of the streets in August 1916 our Group will be holding a plaque unveiling on the same date, a centenary on from each event, to further honour the memory of Wyong's and Tuggerah's brave men.

The Anzac Ave plaque will be unveiled in Frank Balance Park and the Tuggerah plaque will be unveiled in the grounds of Tuggerah Hall.

## Website News


As we are coming up to the end of the year, our research starts to take a backseat to all the dramas of the Festive Season.

# News Flash! Digitized Microfilm: From the Drawer to Your Computer

**Exciting news is here explaining how users will access microfilmed records found in the FamilySearch catalog.** In the early weeks of November, a new feature called the Thumbnail Gallery will be available to the public. Everywhere that historical record images are visible, users can view a single full-screen image or view a gallery of thumbnail (small) images for all images on a microfilm. Parts of this new viewer can be accessed through the Record Hints on Family Tree.

## Thumbnail Gallery

Some new features include:

- Viewing both the indexed data and the image together. This feature is available only with indexed records.
- Navigating to other images within the collection by clicking **Next** or jumping to a specific image.
- Viewing citation information. It is found in an information tab below each image.

## Catalog Icons

In addition to these features, watch for new icons in the FamilySearch catalog. Look for the icons in the Film Notes area of the catalog record title page. The icon links will let you take three specific actions from the catalog page:

- Jump to the indexed records found on a film—click the **search icon**.
- Jump to the gallery view of images from a film—click the **camera icon**.
- Jump to film ordering—click the **film roll icon**.

If indexing is not completed for a film, the indexed (search) icon will not show in the catalog. If a film is not digitized, the camera icon will not show up. Once a film is available digitally, the film ordering icon will disappear.

## Why Is This Important?

This is a huge boon to family history centers. It enables you to take a major leap forward with transitioning from microfilm to digital access. This feature will greatly simplify the record-finding experience for center staff and visitors. Films can be accessed with just a click, rather than dealing with the hassles of ordering films, cost issues, and wait periods. FamilySearch has given priority to scanning the most-requested microfilms.

## Restricted Records

It is important to note that the thumbnail gallery will respect all record restrictions. Some digitized films will be available to anyone at home with a FamilySearch log-in. Other films will be LDS-only or family history center-only. Logged in users will see the camera icon based on their access rights. Only completely unrestricted images will display the camera icon for users who are not logged in. When you notice a film with the format icons, look at the same film as a logged-in user and nonlogged-in user. View films from home and from your family history center. Becoming familiar with the icons will help you be a better resource for answers from your staff and from visitors.

## FHC Film Collection

Please DO NOT begin returning your microfilm collections to Salt Lake. A complete transition to digitized film will happen over several years. You will be notified when the time is right for you to begin returning the film collection in your center. Until you hear from us, please do not send us any part of your film collections.

## Bridging the Gap


FamilySearch and its predecessors drove microfilm technology throughout the twentieth century. Today FamilySearch is a leader in the storage of digital data. The microfilm industry is fading quickly. With their demise, the cost of microfilm is growing exponentially. Soon, blank microfilm for copies will not be available at all. With the thumbnail gallery, FamilySearch is helping users bridge the gap between microfilm and digitized records. This is another opportunity for you and your staff to help member and community patrons find even more success as they seek to find their ancestors.

## Making the most Trove: printing from Trove's digitised newspapers


Hopefully by now you're familiar with the wonders of Trove for family and local history research. History comes alive through over one million family notices, articles and advertisements. Are you making the most of Trove? Would you like to print newspaper articles but don't know how? Follow these steps:

To print an article:

1. Click the 'Print' button at the top of the left-hand column, above the electronically translated text. The article will open in a new window and your browser will ask you to select a printer.



2. Use your browser's print function to print the image.

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# FROM THE LIBRARY

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## GEMS IN THE LIBRARY #2

Have you ever found the date and place of arrival of your ancestors in Australia and then lost any record of them for a few years? Where did they go? What did they do? A recent addition to our CD collection CD527 “*Employment & Dispersal lists Assisted Passengers Arriving 1848-1854 at Moreton Bay, Port Phillip, Sydney and Twofold Bay*” may solve your mystery.

This CD has been installed on computers 1,2,4 and 5 in the Computer room and is accessed under Shipping.

This only covers a short time-span – a mere seven years. However, during these seven years there was a great influx of immigrants who were escaping the poverty caused by the industrial revolution and the mechanisation of farming. They looked to Australia for a better life and Australia needed them.

The information on the lists have been extracted from the NSW Governor’s Despatches with the exception of the general and disposal list of the female immigrants on the *Culloden* which is from the NSW Colonial Secretary’s In-letters. The CD contains 23,262 transcriptions for a total of 117 ships. 64 ships arrived in Sydney, 46 arrived in Port Phillip, 6 arrived in Moreton Bay and 1 in Twofold Bay.

An example is the Smart family from Huntingdonshire who arrived aboard the *Wilson Kennedy* in 1852. The entry reads – “George SMART, 37, farm servant, *Wilson Kennedy*, Departure port Plymouth arrived Sydney 27 Dec 1852. Passage partially defrayed in most cases. 3 days on ship in harbour. Wife Elizabeth, son James, 1m 1f ch 7-11 yrs, 1m ch 1-7 years. Employer Messrs Jas & Wm McArthur Camden. Wages £25. Term 12 months with double rations.”

Son James at age 15 was considered an adult and had a separate entry – “James SMART, 15, farm servant, passage partially defrayed in most cases – 3 days on ship in harbour. Parents George & Elizabeth & c. Gone with his parents.”

3 yr old Elizabeth Smart is mentioned as having died 10 Nov 1853 of diarrhoea during the voyage.

Also on board was George’s older brother John – “John SMART, 32, house servant. Passage partially defrayed in most cases. 3 days on ship in harbour. Wife Elizabeth. Employer both; Mr C Prout, Cooks River near Sydney. Wages both £35. Term 6 months with board & lodging.”

If this was your family, what a wonderful find this would be.

The CD is fully searchable by surname and forename, ship, arrival port or a combination of these. By just typing in a surname you might find another ancestor you didn't know you had.

So, come into the Cottage and have a look at this resource. And remember this information is NOT AVAILABLE ON THE INTERNET.

## Irish Research Tips



### Research Tip of The Week

## Researching the Census Records

When an emigrant has left Ireland prior to 1901, we largely think that might be the end of their story in Irish records. However, a few recent searches have shown the usefulness of searching for the emigrant's parent (s) in the 1901 Census.

My great grandmother, Eliza, (b 1858) took her young family to the US in 1888 taking a large part of my family history to the USA. What I hadn't realized how worthwhile it would prove to search for Eliza's family of origin on the Census. Remarkably, Eliza's elderly mother, Ann, was enumerated in both the 1901 and 1911 Census. This supplied me with the following useful clues for this branch of the family:

- Given that Ann was widowed by 1901, I now had a book end year to search for the death and a possible will for her husband, Mathew.
- The census entry gave me an approx. year of birth for Ann, taking the family back to the early part of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, some twenty years prior to her marriage in the late 1850s, my earliest documented record to date.
- Ann described herself as a farmer, and as head of the household, which included her adult son, and daughter in law. This tells

something of the family dynamic here and that Ann held on to the farm after her son's marriage.

- The census entry provided useful information on Eliza's siblings, which because of her emigration, had been overlooked.
- Eliza's emigration had been prompted by an invitation from her mother's sister. The census had given an approx. age for Ann, so a year of birth could be estimated for Aunt Lucy. Using this year of birth, I have successfully traced Lucy in American records and learnt a whole lot more about this branch of the family and have had the pleasure of establishing contact with one of Lucy's descendants. All this from the 1901 Census.

## Research Tip of the Week

### Marriage Settlements

A recent search had as its starting point a prerogative marriage license bond from 1780. A prerogative marriage license bond indicated that one or both of the parties had substantial resources. The next step for us automatically led to the Registry of Deeds, a potential goldmine for the determined researcher. We hoped to find a marriage settlement for the couple dating to this year and whilst not all marriage settlements were registered, we were fortunate that this one was. It gave us a wealth of information.

We learnt that the groom was an orphan and minor, and 'his considerable fortune' was held in trust. The settlement detailed the name and place of origin of his father and the name of the trustees. We were also given information about the bride's assets and the settlement described with pin-point accuracy the land held by the bride's family, which acted as a gateway for us to fill in details about earlier generations. Both the bride and groom died young and their daughter's marriage settlement in the 1810s was also registered giving us the means to work forward and learn more about the family in the 19th century.
